PARKS NOW 2018 PRIORITIES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

California needs policies and cross-agency partnerships to ensure parks, provide outdoor recreation for urban communities that lack green space, promote access, and greater accountability for public funds.

All Californians deserve access to nature, parks and safe places to play, exercise and gather.

Parks Now Believes Californians Deserve:

- Parks that meet the needs of an increasingly urban, diverse and young California
- Parks that are safe, well-kept, and readily accessible to our communities
- A parks workforce and leadership that reflects California's diverse communities and listens to the needs of the public

Statewide Parks Select Committee | Create a Legislative Select Committee comprised of legislators with diverse interests in parks, to provide a space for ongoing dialogue and policy development regarding park needs throughout the state.

Statewide Needs Assessment | Utilizing the 2015 Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan as a guide, develop and implement a needs assessment of parks in California, specifically identifying needs in park poor areas, and specifying that the assessment will be used to set priorities for state funding of parks.

Action Plan | Develop an action plan to guide how the state park system will increase its presence in urban communities, including through park expansion, cross-agency collaboration (i.e., transportation, public health, social services), programming, and increased access to existing resources.

Jobs | Promote workforce training and recruitment for state, regional, and local park systems for low-income and under-served communities.

PARKS NOW LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

AB 2534 (Limón) - Outdoor Equity Grants

Establishes the Outdoor Equity Grant Funding Program at the Department of Parks and Recreation in order to increase the ability of under-served and at-risk populations and youth to participate in outdoor environmental education programs throughout the State.

Providing funding for transportation, logistics and program operations and capacity costs associated with reaching historically under-served communities will improve access to parks, outdoor experiences, and recreational opportunities, particularly for youth and young adults in disadvantaged communities.

AB 2614 (Carrillo) - Parks: Transportation Access for Youth

Requires the Natural Resources Agency to track the availability of outdoor experiences for disadvantaged youth in a school district by compiling a list of school districts that allow/contract out school buses to be used for non-profits and other agencies to provide outdoor experiences.

The bill also creates a grant program to support organizations in providing such experiences in nature, with the goal of improving the overall health and well-being of these youth, many of which have little to no connectivity or access to travel to outdoor areas around California.

PARKS NOW BUDGET PRIORITIES

Fix Our Parks Facilities, Infrastructure, Access, Recruitment

\$61.5 million, State Parks & Recreation Fund dollars (SB 1)

- Operations & Maintenance: Includes important funding for state park facilities operations and maintenance, seeking to begin to address \$1 billion in back log for things such as clean restrooms, clean water supplies, quality trails, safe roads, preserving historical structures and ensuring adequate service hours.
- Diversity Recruitment \$1 million \$1 million to go towards the continued establishment of a recruitment and training program that supports the creation of a career pipeline of employees that reflect the diverse demographic of California.
- Access Pilot \$500,000 to build on \$1.5 available in 2017-18 budget For engagement/collaboration with stakeholders to provide transportation to state parks from urban areas and schools.
- Staffing \$31.3 million For hiring 364 new positions for interpretation and education, rangers, Park & Rec specialists, concessions, and community engagement.

AB 250 (Gonzalez Fletcher 2017) Low-Cost Coastal Accommodations

• Implementation - \$327,000 from Environmental License Plate Fund to hire staff to conduct coastal assessment required in AB 250, including descriptions of potential coastal sites to develop low-cost accommodations, analyzing local rental rates, supply and demand and projection of costs.

SB 5 (de León 2017) Park Bond Implementation - \$463 million

- \$462 million for grants
- \$1.95 million for hiring of 13 staff positions
- \$3.1 million for Department implementation
